My Impressions of The Penman Magazine: Snapshots of Washington-Lee Students and Signs of Their Times

The Washington-Lee High School Alumni Association's Digital Year Book Project involved scanning all the W-L yearbooks and placing them on the Internet Archive, a non-profit digital library, for anyone with an Internet connection to view.

The W-L Alumni Association decided to add nearly 3,000 pages to the almost 22,000 pages in the 87 yearbooks produced by the students of W-L almost as an afterthought. The addition permitted a significant decrease in the cost to digitize the yearbooks.

After attempting to find 4,000 pages of uncopyrighted text, the current W-L Publications sponsor, Catherine Misar, mentioned that the bound copies of The Penman Magazine might provide the necessary number of pages. All bound Penman Magazines from 1948 through 1973 consisted of almost 4,000 pages and were sufficient to surpass the 25,000 page requirement for the reduced scanning price.

This was my first experience with The Penman. As a student from 1950 to 1953. I was not aware of the contents of this magazine. I can't remember if I ever read one during my student years. However, as I began counting pages in each bound set I soon became aware of this treasure trove. Short stories, drawings, poems and advertisements filled the pages. Even so, I did not spend a lot of time perusing the magazines until they were finally scanned and placed on the Internet. Then I had a wordsearch capability provided by the PDF format. The collection of bound magazines was placed on the Internet Archive in the summer of 2013. Access to these issues of The Penman can be obtained from the W-L high school web page under the "ALUMNI" tab. They can be accessed on-line (for the best resolution) or downloaded in PDF format for storage on local systems.

Naturally my first search used the word "High" and so many citations were produced I revised my search using my sister's name, Darrell-High, and scanned the set. This quick search found her short story – "Chariot" which was the ELOS (Arts Honor Society) Short Story Award Winner in 1951. That search piqued my curiosity and I have conducted many searches since then.

The Penman was the idea of Mary M. Councell, an English teacher at W-L from 1945 until 1960. Its first issue was published in April of 1948. The first few years of the magazine produced primarily textual stories and poems with very little artwork. The articles then and through the early 50's had themes related to World War II. Advertisements were initially attached to the end of each issue of The Penman. Over time the staff began to integrate the advertisements along with the text and art. Some of the artwork is startling.

Poetry ranged from the abstract to the real world and often reflected the personal feelings of the student authors. Short stories addressed contemporary events and provide interesting insights into from students' viewpoints.

Stories of teachers who had made great impressions upon student writers are sprinkled throughout the magazine. The magazine also speaks of the great sports victories during the mid-1960's from the eyes and hearts of the players themselves. I found Milton Irvin's March 1951 story of the first W-L Crew and its founder and coach, Charlie Butt an exciting read.

The Basketball teams of the 1960's were very successful. Ed Hummer, one of W-L's finest ballplayers, wrote "Story of a State Title" in the Spring 1963 issue after his team won the Virginia State Basketball Championship. That year, Ed was a senior and co-captain of the basketball team. Three years later team co-captain John Hummer, Ed's younger brother, wrote about his own team's 1966 state title win. John followed his brother to Princeton University that autumn.




"Successful Bid for a State Title" by John Hummer, The Penman, Spring 1965-66.



Recent Additions Outside the Washington-Lee Theater Highlight Student and Alumni Achievements in the Arts

Alumni touring the school this fall were greeted by two recent additions outside the Washington-Lee High School Theater related to the arts – one showcases contributions by current students while the other highlights achievements by our alumni.

Across from the Alumni Conference room, just outside the theater doors stand two new trophy cases filled with with Band and Choral trophies. The awards displayed highlight the high caliber of Washington-Lee High School's music programs – and these represent only 2012-13 school year competitions. The choral, band, and orchestra rooms hold

many more awards from previous years.





The case on the left holds choral and orchestral awards from the 2013 WorldStrides Heritage Performance in New York. WorldStrides sponsors student performance festivals and events around the country and abroad. The awards case incorporates photographs of orchestra members along with the awards. The right-hand case contains the band's awards from the 2013 Fiestaval competition in Myrtle Beach, which the band has participated in for many years. The new trophy case can barely hold all the awards won by the band at this year's Fiestaval, including four "Champion" and one "Grand Champion" awards. We look forward to seeing future musical achievements on display!

Passing through the doors into the theater lobby brings students and visitors face to face with framed movie posters showcasing five of our Academy Award winning alumni. Under each poster is a plaque with their names, graduation year, and awards. The display, in place since last January, was Facilities Manager Doug Zebrak's idea:

"We needed to dress up the lobby of the theater, and with such a rich history of successful alumni in Hollywood it seemed to me like a perfect match." The first poster from the movie *Gloria* represents Gena Rowlands '47. Rowlands was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Actress twice and won for *Gloria* (1980). Rowlands has been nominated for a Golden Globe multiple times, and her two Best Actress wins are noted here: *A Woman Under the Influence* (1974) and *The Betty Ford Story* (1987). Next is a poster for *Terms of Endearment* (1983) representing Shirley MacLaine '52, then *Reds* (1981) for Warren Beatty '55. Beatty received a Best Director Academy Award for *Reds*, beating out Hugh Hudson for *Chariots of Fire* and Steven Spielberg for *Raiders of the Lost Ark*.

Sandra Bullock '82 is the final alumna represented here by a poster for *The Blind Side* (2009). Her performance won her an Academy Award for Best Actress, among other awards. Zebrak hopes that the display inspires current students: "Those alumni on the wall were in the same position as them at one point. Anything is possible with some hard work." Submitted by Jennifer M. From the Archives

Early issues of The Penman included faculty contributions. The first issue's April 1948 "Faculty Features" premiered with two poems that English faculty member and 1938 W-L alumna Betty Toone wrote during her studies at Madison College (now James Madison University). October's "Faculty Features" included two contributions by Edith Purcell under the penname (her maiden name) Edith Winfrey. Mrs. Purcell taught typing and shorthand to W-L students from 1938 to 1959. "Days," republished below, is one of those poems.

DAYS By Edith Winfrey

In all the misty scenes of days gone past,
Some are forgotten and like autumn leaves
Fallen from the trees, have lain down at last
Upon old leaves, that upon older leaves,
Have become a part of the ages vast.

But among these scenes some are as sweet flow'rs
Sent to us like patches of heaven
On earth, and plucked in a few golden hours,
Pressed in mem'ry's pages like a leaven
Of rare perfume, they linger and are ours.
