<u>Smart Growth planning principles</u> = open space, abundant pedestrian connections, connects neighborhoods

12 Points of LEED =

- 1. Site Selection built up rather than sprawling building
- 2. Alternative Transportation access to public buses, bike riders
- 3. Heat Island Reduction used light colored concrete and roof gardens
- 4. Water Efficient Landscaping uses no permanent irrigation system
- 5. Construction Waste Management 92% of scrap metals recycled: used recycled concrete, metal, brick, drywall, wood, glass, plastic, etc.
- 6. Construction Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) Management diligent about keeping site clean during construction
- 7. Water Efficiency dual flush toilets, waterless urinals
- 8. Energy Efficiency lights go on when rooms in use; off when not. Cooling/heating only in areas being used
- 9. Recycled Content materials used are from recycled sources
- 10.Regional Materials 27% of materials came from within 500 miles of site
- 11.Outdoor Air Delivery Monitoring carbon dioxide sensors in rooms monitor level and provide fresh air when too high. Keeps kids alert in class!
- 12.Low-Emitting Materials used in building to keep Volatile Organic Compounds (VOC's) at low amounts: paints, sealants, carpets, adhesives. Promotes good health.

- *W-L was certified LEED Gold in 2009 Cost: approx. \$100 million
- *Wakefield High School was certified LEED Gold in Sept. 2013 -trying for Platinum certification

"The scope of the proposed modifications is not sufficient to pursue LEED Certification. However, the project will be implemented as though it were pursuing LEED. Green building design principles and best practices will be followed throughout the design and construction process."

Note: 92% of waste generated during construction was recycled; concrete, metal, asphalt, wood, cardboard and plastic.

14% of the materials for W-L were made from recycled materials including insulation and ceiling tiles.

<u>Information about the \$5M - CAPACITY OPTIMIZATION PROJECT</u> <u>Moving from 1,900 to 2,200 instructional seats....Completed in 2016</u>

- Limits on land dictate that expansion of the building cannot allow growth. Strategies were needed to get more use out of the existing facilities. W-L was the first 21st Century high school in Arlington County and opened almost a decade ago. It now needs to have adjustments made to adhere to the evolving world of education.
- The school has maintained eight relocatable classrooms to add more seating: A goal of this project is to remove those temporary buildings.
- A study was launched in 2014 to evaluate the situation and recommend a solution. The current project is addressing the issues: The utilization of available seats throughout the full seven period day. In order to use the classrooms (seats) over a full day, teachers had to be provided with work spaces for effective collaborative planning away from their instructional room assignments.
- -The following modifications addressed 4 sets of issues to achieve the three goals of the Capacity Optimization Project and were completed in the 2016 school year.
 - Increasing Classroom Capacity

 installing operable partitions to split large rooms into two smaller rooms
 - Providing Teacher Collaboration Spaces

 having large-scale central suites and small "drop-in" spaces
 on all 3 upper floors
 - Addressing Other Capacity Limits

 expanding use of the concourse, veranda and courtyard to be used during lunch periods
 improving conditions for IB and AP testing
 - -relocating Principal's office to the Concourse to make central administration more accessible to students, teachers and community
 - Furnishings and Technology

 provide flexible and adaptable furnishings throughout the building
 - -Wi Fi capabilities strengthened and charging stations installed throughout the building




